



VISIT MILWAUKEE AT MID-CENTURY

Please join us at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, April 5th in the Hunt Room of the Hales Corners Library. Our program is *Through the Lens of a Master, the Photographs of Lyle Oberwise*, and will be presented by **Steve Schaffer**, Assistant Archivist at the Milwaukee County Historical Society.



Steve will show a series of color slides from the 1940s and 1950s that were used in the publication *Milwaukee at Mid-Century*. This presentation has the feel of a family slide show, and audience participation is welcome. Steve will also tell how this set of slides was nearly lost.

Sadly, we are discontinuing the traditional potluck supper before our April program, as participation has dropped over the past two years. However, we will still offer refreshments after the meeting.

ANNUAL MEETING

The Cabin Open Houses resume the first Saturdays of May through November, and on the 4th of July.

As we already have a canoe (with sail) on display in the Cabin, we will temporarily store this more traditional canoe in our new space. Special thanks go out to **Wally Wolak** for helping us to acquire this canoe for our collection.

Dreyfuss Hotel on Forest Home Avenue in Hales Corners. Entitled *Hales Corners Horse Market Midwinter*, the painting depicts a snowy scene with horses pulling sleds past the old hotel in 1911. Our Society happens to have a small copy of this painting in our office.



The artist, **Richard Lorenz** (1855-1915), today is considered one of the foremost painters of Western genre after

Frederic Remington. His first trips out West in 1887-88 inspired a number of Western scenes for which he is now nationally known.

Lorenz was born in Germany, studied sculpture and drawing there, and emigrated to Milwaukee in 1886. He originally worked on Panorama paintings in Milwaukee and Chicago. In 1901, he was one of the founding members of the Society of Milwaukee Artists, later known as the Wisconsin Painters and Sculptors.
