FATHER JERRY PROFILED IN CATHOLIC HERALD



The April 26th edition of the *Catholic Herald* newspaper featured a full-page interview with **Fr. Jerome Hudziak**. Until recently, Fr. Jerry was HCHS Program Chairman, and has a long history in Hales Corners.

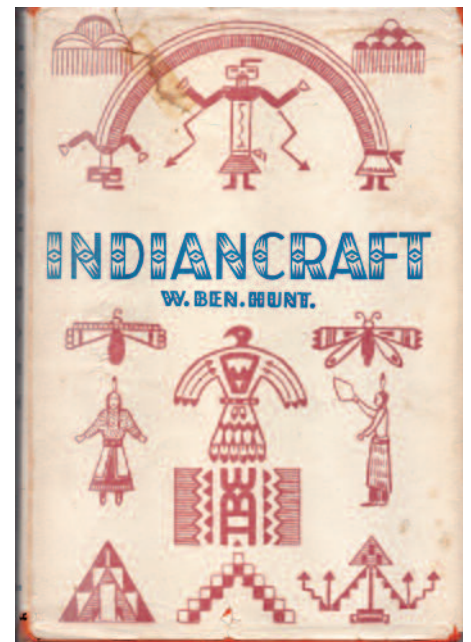
His father had a shoe repair store on Forest Home Avenue across the street from the current Hale House restaurant. Fr. Jerry has often commented that he first worked in the shoe store saving soles and a few heels. Later, he joined the priesthood and its soul-saving mission.

Ordained in 1964, Fr. Jerry has served as a Director at St. Francis de Sales Seminary, and as Pastor at St. Rita and St. Joseph parishes in the Milwaukee area. In 2005, he received the Vatican II Award for his service in the priesthood.


TWO MORE BEN HUNT BOOKS ADDED TO OUR COLLECTION

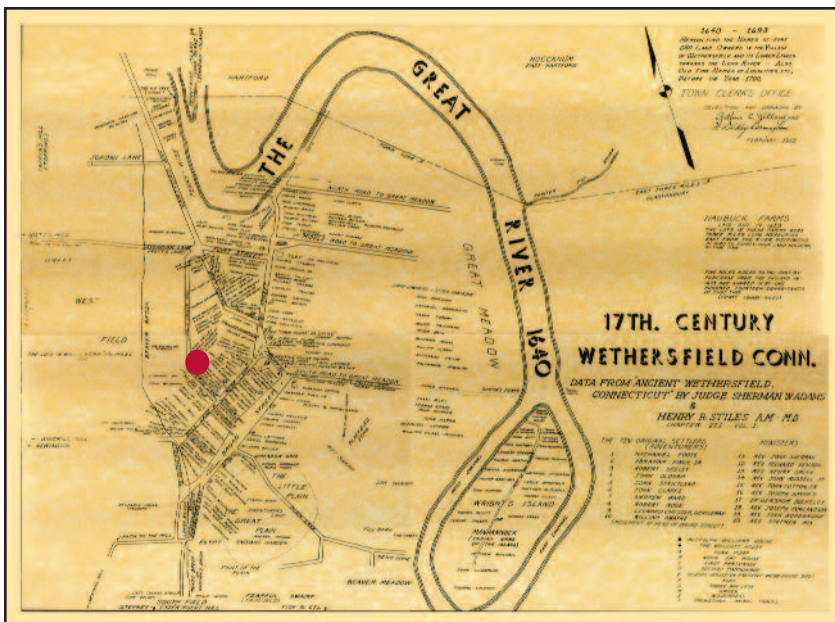

SEVENTEENTH CENTURY MAP DESIGNATES FIRST HOME OF OUR HALES FAMILY IN AMERICA

The map below was donated to our Society by **Frank Matusinec**, a long-time member of HCHS. Thanks, Frank! The red dot designates the home of Captain Samuel Hale, the great-great-great-great-grandfather of Village founders William and Seneca Hale.

Capt. Samuel Hale was born on July 1, 1615 in Watton-at-Stone, Hertfordshire, England. He traveled to New England about 1634, possibly with brother Thomas and sister Martha. They lived in Hartford County, Connecticut Colony in 1636. Samuel volunteered as a soldier during the Pequot (Indian) War of 1637, serving under Capt. John Mason.

He moved to Wethersfield, Hartford County in 1642. While there, he was appointed a Selectman in 1647 and one of the Proprietors of Norwalk in 1654. Samuel also served as Deputy from the Town to General Court of the State Legislature. He leased the estate of Governor Willis in 1660. Samuel Hale died on November 9, 1693 in Wethersfield, and was buried in Glastonbury, Connecticut.

80 YEARS AGO (1938)

Street signs are put up throughout Hales Corners.

70 YEARS AGO (1948)

Long distance telephone service from Hales Corners to Milwaukee is now available.

Emanuel Church merges to form the United Church of Christ.

60 YEARS AGO (1958)

Boys' and girls' swim suits are 98 cents and up at Drews. A 48 inch wading pool costs \$2.88.

The Hales Corners Village Board passes an ordinance to cut down all trees with Dutch Elm disease.

50 YEARS AGO (1968)

Plans move forward to open the new Hales Corners swimming pool this summer.

Ground is broken for the new Hales Corners municipal building.

The Hales Corners Woman's Club authorizes \$10,000 to furnish the civic room in the new Hales Corners municipal building.
